In primary schools across the country there is one time of year that stands out more than any other... Christmas! Hailsham Primary Academy has been no different, we have had a fantastic time since





Our performances included the College Orchestra and HCC Singers, Primary choir and talented Year 8 soloist, Jacob.


Once again Hailsham Town Council and the Mayor were very pleased with our contribution to this highly significant community event.


# **Year Group Updates**

## **Pre School – Mrs Claydon**




We have had a lovely term with the Turtles in Pre School. We have been exploring the topic, 'What we celebrate'.

## **Reception – Mrs Chapman and Miss Payne**

This term, our topic has been 'I wonder what people can celebrate?' We have looked at some of the things that the children celebrate themselves, as well as some celebrations around the world.

We started by learning about Bonfire Night. Children created their own fireworks pictures and explored onomatopoeic words! We also talked about why we celebrate Remembrance day and children created their own poppy pictures.



We then travelled to India to learn all about the Hindu celebration of Diwali, the Festival of Light. The children enjoyed making their own Rangoli patterns and their own Diya Lamps after learning about the story of Rama and Sita.



We were lucky to be able to visit Hellingly Church to find out all about the Christian celebration of Christingle. Every child made their own Christingles to take home. We have also been learning about the Christmas story and have been busy practising for our Nativity play!



Our key text this term is 'The Gingerbread Man'. We had a special delivery from Granny's bakery, but when we opened the box, there was a gingerbread man shaped hole in the bottom – he had escaped!! The children went on a search around the school to try and find him – they found him hiding in our outside area! We have been learning to retell this story with actions, using a story map. The children then innovated the story, changing the fox at the end to a different animal.



In Maths we have been exploring 2D shapes. We used this learning to produce some Kandinsky inspired artwork which has formed our new display!



### **Year 1 – Mrs Sweet and Miss Hamilton**

We have been fully immersing ourselves in the Christmas spirit this term and have been busy making Christmas decorations and learning Christmas songs. We are also looking forward to our trip to Hailsham Library this term where the children will be read a Christmas themed story by the librarian and the children will have the opportunity to select a book to take home.



This term we enjoyed 'Geography awareness week'. The theme in Year 1 was 'food'. The children learnt where our food comes from and finished the week by designing their own lunch box.



In English our key text has been 'Janet the Jellyfish and the Fierce Shark'. The children were excited to walk into their classrooms to find a giant jellyfish! The children have changed the characters in the story to create their own versions.

Science has been fun this term learning about our five senses. We tasted food, used our sense of smell to identify different foods and used our senses of sight, sound and touch to play games.



We have completed the addition and subtraction (within 10) unit this term. The children have learnt key skills, using different representations to add and subtract, such as tens frames and part whole models. They have been introduced to number sentences and solved addition and subtraction problems.

#### **Let's Explore London**

We started the term with learning about London, along with its key landmarks. We then moved on to learning about the other countries and capital cities in the United Kingdom.

In our writing lessons, the children learnt our class story, 'The Magic Sword,' a story that, having touched a particular item, takes the protagonist on a magical adventure. Once learnt, the children made their own changes to the class story to make it their own. The children were very creative, writing stories that took their main character to many wonderful places!





During Geography Awareness Week, our children have learned that geography can be seen all around us, and have explored the human, physical and environmental geography linked to a range of topics. They enjoyed discussing how humans can make a positive impact upon the world around them.

The children have enjoyed being designers this term. They have been tasked with creating a tote bag, thinking deeply about how their product designs can appeal to a particular user. Once the designs were created, all that was left to do was make the bags! Having practised our stitching earlier in the term, we are sure that these bags will be a great success!





In addition to all of this, we have been busily practising our Christmas performance of 'It's a Baby!'. The children have thrown themselves into the rehearsals, they have been learning their lines, dances, songs and actions very well.

## **Year 3 – Mr Brown and Mrs Manley**


Term 2 in Year 3 has been wonderful. The children have worked so hard and are very much looking forward to Christmas.




In English, we've been thoroughly captivated by our new text, *Krindlekrax*. Drawing inspiration from its vivid characters and settings, we've crafted detailed descriptions and are now channelling our creativity into developing our very own monster-themed stories!

In maths we have been diving deeper into multiplication and division, exploring strategies to solve problems with confidence and accuracy. To sharpen our skills, we're continuing to use Times Tables Rock Stars (TTRS), making learning our times tables both fun and engaging as we strive to become true masters of multiplication!

In Science, we've been exploring the exciting world of electricity! We've been building circuits and discovering how they work, while also learning about conductors and insulators and their roles in carrying or blocking electric current.

In Science, we have been looking at animals, including humans. The children have learnt about aging, looking at different animals, including humans.







In Maths, we have looked at prime, square and cubed numbers. We have recapped the formal method for multiplication and division. This term we have also been learning about fractions, using the language of numerator, denominator, and our division and multiplication to support us with equivalent fractions, improper fractions and mixed numbers.

In English, we have been reading 'Curiosity: The Story of Mars Rover' by Markus Motum. We have used this book to write a non-fiction biography and a fiction journey tale.

We have been looking at the grammar involved in writing in different genres and understanding how it can impact our work.

Every student has continued to grow both academically and personally and it has been lovely to see some of their personalities come out more as they all become more comfortable in their new school setting. It is always interesting spending breaktimes around the canopy listening to their funny stories about school and their weekends!

Thank you to all those students who have represented the school in sports fixtures. You have been a credit to yourselves and the school. It has also been nice to pop in to some of the extra-curricular activities to see how much fun everyone is having! The ratio of positives to negatives is overwhelmingly positive (92%) and while there is, of course, always room for improvement Year 7 have most certainly had a very impressive first two terms here at Hailsham Community College.

#### Uniform

We want all our students in Year 7 to be dressed smartly and professionally. We find this has a positive knock-on impact on their behaviour across the school and their learning in the classroom – 'Be Ready' is part of Our Hailsham Way. Again this term we have noticed that some students have started to have their shirts untucked frequently and are not wearing their blazers or ties until reminded to do so.

While this may not seem a massive deal it does take time to correct and address which prevents staff from continuing with positive interactions and ensuring the climate in the classrooms and school is ready to learn. Can you please support us by reminding your son/daughter of the importance of being smart and ready at all times.

#### Lateness/Truancy

Almost all of our year group attend all lessons, on time, with no issues at all. By now all students should know where their lessons are, and, with the transition time between, should not be arriving at their classrooms late. There are still small pockets of students in our year who are consistently being late. This has a detrimental impact on the climate of the school as it not only affects their learning but also the learning of the class when they do arrive. A report is sent to mentors every day with this information and is followed up accordingly, and where appropriate, sanctions put in place, including break time and after school detentions or reflection. Students that fail to attend lessons through choice are followed up and sanctioned accordingly. This is not a culture we accept here at Hailsham Community College and the students are very aware of this. Please can you remind your son/daughter of the importance of being on time, being organised and being in the right place, promptly.

Term 2 has brought such success to Year 7. The students continue to impress me every day and they really are making the school proud. I hope you all have a lovely festive break and I look forward to continuing the journey with the students when they return in January. Enjoy the well-earned rest!

### Miss Newman - Head of Year 8

Firstly I would like to thank all of you as parents and carers for all of your support so far this academic year. We know that it takes a lot of effort from you at home to ensure your child is in school every day, on time, in their correct uniform and behaving in a way that allows them and others to learn. The overwhelming majority of our year group do the right things all the time and I really thank you for your input to ensure this happens. We are fast establishing ourselves as one of the 'top' year groups in terms of behaviour and attendance. On a day to day basis our year group is often hitting the high 80s in terms of positive to negative ratio, ie for every 10 actions going through Class Charts, at least 8 of them are achievement points rather than behaviour points. We are often 1<sup>st</sup> or 2<sup>nd</sup> out of all of the year groups in terms of attendance, with our average attendance usually coming in around 92%. There is still work to be done here but we are absolutely moving in the right direction.

In terms of achievement points and rewards, 89% of the year group have now achieved 'bronze award'. This is for anyone who has 100 or more achievement points. If your son/daughter has hit 100 this term, they will be recognised with their badge and the certificate on Thursday of the final week. 30% of the year group have gone one step further and achieved 'silver award'. This is for anyone who has 250 achievement points. Anyone who achieves this by Friday 13<sup>th</sup> December, will be invited on a reward trip to the cinema to see a Christmas film. They will be given their badge and certificate during the trip and I cannot wait to celebrate with them.

One of the things that I enjoy the most about my year group is how much they embrace opportunities that come their way. Year 8 have been asked the provide student leaders for many different activities this year. This has ranged from helping at the primary school cross country events, to being tour guides for perspective parents and children. A huge thank you and well done to anyone who has been involved in any of our leadership opportunities. Most recently students had an assembly about the

role of peer mentors and off the back of this we had 20 students apply for this role. They will be interviewed after Christmas, trained up and then will start their work supporting vulnerable students in our school community. I am incredibly proud of everyone who applied.

We have had lots of sporting success so far this year. Our Year 8 netball team is unbeaten and both our A and B teams recently played up a year against other schools and won both of their games. Netball academy and Netball club is really well attended and will continue next term. Our boys' football team have had lots of success too against local schools. We also hosted a B team tournament and entered two teams. I was so impressed by everyone involved in that tournament, their attitude and effort was absolutely outstanding!!

In a recent assembly I spoke about commitment and how no one achieves anything by accident, you cannot achieve if you don't commit. I challenged everyone in that assembly to choose something that they would commit to and in turn think through exactly what they were going to do in order to show commitment and achieve what they set out for. Please do ask your son/daughter what it is that they will be committing to. It might be they want to improve their reading age, it might be that they want to get picked for a school team, they may want to come top of their class in their next assessment. This links in really well with New Year resolutions and I hope everyone has something in mind that they will be aiming for next term.

Lastly I would like to say a huge congratulations to Molly who, in November, won a local short story competition, in association with Hailsham FM. She was the youngest entrant! Molly's story was actually read on air by the actor Brian Capron (known for his role in Coronation Street). What a incredible achievement! I was also extremely proud to hear about Alex, Amy and Sophie's achievements with the local trampolining club, Jump TC. They recently competed at the British Schools Competition, with many of them winning their category and/or qualifying for the next round in January. I am always blown away by the variety of different talents in my year group and really enjoy celebrating their successes with them. 

### Sixth Form – Mr Lambert



There's no shortage of Christmas cheer in the Sixth Form at the moment. The Common Room and café area have been beautifully decorated by Year 12, with Year 13 adding festive flourishes to the Quiet Study Room, Sixth Form Library and the newly equipped Sixth Form IT Hub.

We have also seen our Sixth Form extra-curricular activities thriving. Personal Development is at the heart of our mission as a College and the Sixth Form aims to create a community where our students can become confident, articulate and active citizens alongside their academic study. A Level Politics and History students experienced incredible opportunities on

educational visits recently. History students joined the Holocaust Educational Trust on a lifechanging visit to Auschwitz-Birkenau in Poland. This was part of the Lessons from Auschwitz Programme, which also saw them attend two seminars to learn about the impact of the Holocaust on the individuals targeted by the Nazis and their collaborators and produce a project to share what they've learned with our community.

On Monday 27<sup>th</sup> January, Holocaust Memorial Day, we will be holding a screening of award-winning 2023 film One Life, starring Sir Anthony Hopkins and Helena Bonham Carter at Hailsham Pavilion Cinema. The film tells the extraordinary true story of an ordinary man, Sir Nicholas Winton, who helped save thousands of refugee children from persecution in Nazi Germany and will be preceded by a short talk from our Sixth Form students who visited Auschwitz-Birkenau. As a Holocaust Beacon School, HCC is accredited by UCL as a hub for learning about the Holocaust and we would love our community to join us at this event. You can get your tickets for only £5 from the Hailsham Pavilion Box Office.

Two Politics students visited Parliament to watch Prime Minister's Questions last week. They were in the Public Gallery of the House of Commons as Prime Minister Sir Keir Starmer faced off against new



Conservative Party leader Kemi Badenoch in her second PMQs, before heading for a behind the scenes tour of Parliament led by a staff member for a Labour MP. It was a fascinating glimpse of how our democracy and government works, watching the Business Secretary taking serious questions about the closure of the Vauxhall factory in Luton as well as trying to spot MPs we know from the telly as they gossiped in the café in Portcullis House!

I have been delighted to see so many of our Year 10 and 11 students joining the Sixth Form Debate Club. Our students are unfailingly brilliant, debating with skill, humour and confidence and displaying more nuance and openness to new ideas than we saw in the House of Commons! Topics this term have included 'there should be a maximum age limit for politicians' inspired by the US Presidential Election, 'transgender women should be able to participate in elite competitive sport' and a festive special debating whether the focus on Santa Claus has ruined Christmas! Debate has always been a hit at Hailsham Sixth Form, with our teams often emerging victorious from our Wealden Cup competitions with other local schools. However, the real prize is our HCC Debating trophy and that competition will begin in the new year.

Another returning Sixth Form classic is the Cinema club, with students KS4 and 5 students enjoying reduced price tickets to Hailsham Pavilion Cinema for Paddington in Peru this week, having previously spent Halloween watching the new Beetlejuice film. Next up is Wicked, although the singing coming from the Common Room this week suggests a few have already seen that!

Hailsham students continue to achieve amazing things and our Sixth Form provides a fun, welcoming community where you can follow your passions while being taught by subject experts in a environment with staff that know you and care about you. So there's plenty still to come before Christmas, including the much-anticipated Year 12 vs Year 13 football match, our annual Christmas Common Room Quiz and Winter Dance Show.



## **Lessons From Auschwitz – Isaac, Year 12**



Before I went to Auschwitz I thought I knew a lot about the Holocaust, I'd been studying about for seven years, starting with The Boy In The Striped Pyjamas being read to my primary school class and ever since had been fascinated with how the execution of over six million people could be done in the time frame given. So I studied the Nazis, what and who they were, what they stood for and how they carried their plans. Interesting to be sure, but in doing so I lost the interest in the victims and instead concentrated on the perpetrators. I found six million murdered victims to be a statistic, a number, an insane number yes, but I could never truly understand how this could happen. That was until the 15th November 2024, a day I will never forget.

When we arrived at Auschwitz 1 we saw a massive complex of buildings with walkways and areas hidden by walls. The tone suddenly shifted from excited to interest but above all feelings of dread at what we would see. From here on there was no going back.

We walked through many of the buildings, all with their own exhibitions to tell the story of what happened here. Some buildings had halls of pictures of Holocaust victims, others showed physical items such as bags, shoes, toys but probably the most insane being a mountain of hair that had been chopped from the victims' heads as a way of dehumanising them.

But the most life changing exhibit I saw was a building including the Book of Names, it was a beautiful memorial yet heartbreaking in every way. It showed Jewish life before the war with children playing, Rabbi's praying and families dancing. They were living, they were





breathing and most of all they were happy. Everything about seeing six million deaths being

nothing more than a massive statistic was drop kicked out the window never to come back. This room broke me for it made me realise how this really did happen to all of them, this place of death and torture was the final destination for these people who had done nothing wrong. Their crime being born a Jew, a gypsy, a homosexual or standing up against the Nazis' political regime. It made me really question how could this happen. How these were children who didn't know anything about

politics...they just wanted to play and be free like any child should, but all their futures were taken from them by a regime so brutal in nature that the people couldn't see the blood on their hands.

At Auschwitz-Birkenau we saw the infamous railroad leading into the camp. This time the tour consisted of going in the reconstructed shacks that would somehow pass for a place to sleep, and we saw the crematorium that had been burned to the ground by members of the SS to hide what they'd done from the world. After this we entered a memorial site at the back with engraved plates commemorating those who died here. A ceremony soon followed led and ended by Rabbi Epstein who spoke about trying to inspire us to live our lives free of hate, to love and respect one another and best of all to show that where the most evil in humanity raises it's head there is also a kind, gentle good side that always faced it for as he quoted "With the moon as witness...100 years ago there was no Auschwitz Camp there were people farming the land in peace".

The trip changed and added a part to me I'll bare for the rest of my life and I'll always be proud of it. I hope you understand that these events in history aren't just scary or interesting. This was a lesson, that no matter how high it rises, how powerful it becomes and how closely it gets to you, evil can't win...and to do that we must make sure that this never happens again.

## **SEND Update – Mr Patrick-Dawson, Deputy SENCo**

This term, our amazing team of teaching assistants have supported students with a range of interventions including talk fitness; zones of regulation; numeracy and literacy boosters; forest school; sensory circuits; Lego-based therapy and we

are just about to begin a new emotional literacy programme, Think Good, Feel Good.

The teacher in our nurture classroom is building towards transitions back to mainstream lessons through carefully considered phased timetables and we're getting into the Christmas spirit in the Hub.

Who knew that making paper chains is the perfect regulation strategy!

## SEN Review

The SEN team welcomed staff from East Sussex County Council in November to conduct a SEN review across the school.

We were so proud of the students who volunteered to be part of a focus panel to discuss their views of how they are supported in school. They were honest, and constructive with their feedback to professionals.



The comments from ESCC were positive about the developments that have been made with SEN across the school, and we have some key themes to make SEN at HCC even better!

## Y10 Drama Performance

Some of our Y10 students took part in a drama performance this term. It was evident that the group had worked so hard in rehearsals and it was fantastic to see such an inclusive performance.





One of the actors, explains:

'It was about some teenagers going to the pool for the day; I was the Dad of four children. The play focused on how teenagers feel about growing up. I think we put on a very good show, we all worked together and I think we couldn't have done better. It was the best show I have ever put on!'

#### Another said:

'It was a really good performance, we all got on as a big group, and if anyone didn't know their lines, anyone would go and help out with it. It was really fun'.



## Nurture

Students in the nurture classroom have made amazing progress this term. They have been focussing on social and emotional strategies to help understand themselves and others. They have worked well together as a team through junk model building, team games and discussions.

The nurture classroom has been opened up to more students to support through art therapy which has helped to develop conversations whilst allowing a place to express feelings, as well as amazing artwork.










## Top tip from our Zones of Regulation sessions!

When your child is angry, you can help them to recognise this emotion by saying things like:

'I notice that you are **angry** because your hands are clenched and hot,' or

'I can see you are very **frustrated** because your breathing is fast and shallow.'

Naming the emotion will help support your child to identify ways to regulate themselves. You can then work with them to find the best strategy to work through the anger.



## FIVE FINGER POSITIVTY CHALLENGE

Every day, practise identifying and saying out loud five strengths and positive qualities that you possess.

You could adapt this and think of different things each day; five qualities that make you a good friend, five of your life goals, five things you enjoy doing, five things you are proud of, five things that make you unique etc.

Cooking is such an important life skill. Students were given an optional lesson learning how to make cottage pie. We were really impressed with the chopping skills and teamwork we

saw. All students followed the recipe and left with a tasty smelling dish to enjoy at home.






# Learning Support



# What Parents & Educators Need to Know about



OF RESTRICTION

Snapchat is a messaging app which allows users to send images, videos and texts to others. Its best-known feature is that anything sent 'disappears' 24 hours after it's bee viewed; however, users are known to take screenshots or use another device to obtain photo of their screen. In 2023, Snapchat added a chatbat function called 'My Al'.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?



My Ai is Snapchat's new chattot, which replies to questions in a human-like manner. However, the software is still in its infancy and has significant drawbacks, such as biosed, incorrect or misleading responses. There have already been numerous reports of young users turning to Ai for medical help and diagnoses, which could be inaccurate and therefore potentially dramaerous. potentially dangerous.

#### PREDATORS AND SCAMS

Predators can exploit Snapchat's disappearing messages by, for example, telling a user they have noticed photos of them and will post them unless they're pold. Snapchat's own research found that 65% of teenagers had experienced this – on this app or others. This likely int'n Helpad by 'Snapchaps' – a feature which highlights your exact position in real-time. This is meant to help friends keep track of each other, but could be used for more sinister reasons.

#### MY EYES ONLY

Snapchat has a hidden photo vault called "My Eyes Only". Teens can conceal sensitive photos and videos from parents and carers in this folder, which is protected by a PIN. You can check for this by clicking on the icon which looks like two playing cards. This takes you to the 'Memories' folder which stores photos, stories and the My Eyes Only folder.

#### SCREEN TIME ADDICTION

Snapchat prioritises user engagement, with features file atreaks (messaging the same person every day to build up a high score). The app also has sections called "Discover" and "Spattight", which show talkored contant to each user. However, this could also be seen as an attempt to hook users into watching videos endlessly. Furthermore, constant notifications can lure people into using the gare. people into using the app.

#### INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Some content on Snapchat simply lan't suitable for children. The hashtags used to group content are determined by the poster, so even an innocent search term could still yield age inappropriate results. The app's 'disappearing messages' feature also makes it easy for young people to share explicit images on imputier - so sexting continues to be a risk associated with Snapchat.

#### **ONLINE PRESSURES**

Although many of Snapchat's filters are designed to entertain or amuse, the 'beautify' effects on photos can set unrealistic body image expectati creating feelings of inadequacy in younger users. Snapchat now also has 'priority' notifications (which still get displayed even if a device is in 'do not disturb' mode), increasing the pressure on users to log back in





