Here's to many more years of sporting excellence. Keep up the fantastic work - you inspire us all!








## **Photo Challenge - Miss Gorman**

## **Year Group Updates**

## **Pre School - Mrs Claydon**

This term's topic has been all about what makes a story and Fairytales. Our key text books this term have been The Three Billy Goats Gruff and Each Peach Pear Plum.

We have loved creating our own bridges and testing our ideas by seeing if our bridges are stable. We have role-played the story The Three Billy Goats Gruff and taking on a role through the story. We have been reading the story and the children have been great at retelling the story independently and filling in missing phrases.







We have also explored the story The Three Little Pigs and really enjoyed it, the children have shown great involvement and loved builing the different houses and reading the story. We have used playdough to create the Three Little Pigs. We have created our own big houses and enjoyed painting them before using them to role-play the story.







It has been a busy but fun last term with the Turtles and we have all loved exploring a variety of stories together. Some of our Turtles will be moving up to school in September. It has been a pleasure teaching and watching them grow. They are all ready for school and all of us in preschool wish them the very best as they start in reception.

## Reception – Mrs Chapman and Miss Payne

This term in reception we have been wondering what makes a story. We started off the term by reading Goldilocks and Three Bears. The children took on the role of Goldilocks and wrote sorry letters to Baby Bear apologising for the naughty things that Goldilocks did! We also tasted some different flavoured porridge! Golden syrup was the most popular flavour in both classes.





Next we read The Three Little Pigs. The children all took part in a science experiment called 'The Huff and Puff Test'. The children had a selection of different materials and had to decide whether or not it would be a good material to build a house out of. The children then took on the role of the Big Bad Wolf and tried to blow the materials across the table. We discovered that stones would be a good material to make a house out of, but feathers wouldn't be!! The children also constructed houses out of lots of different materials, and made pigs out of modelling clay.











Continuing with the Big Bad Wolf, our next story was Little Red Riding Hood. The children created a character description of the Big Bad Wolf and then made 'Wanted' posters. We used this story as an opportunity to discuss 'Stranger Danger' with the children and revisit our previous discussions about trusted adults.

Our key text this term is 'The Little Red Hen'. The children learnt to retell the text using a story map and actions. We also learnt a rap to retell the story! The children all made their own bread rolls and wrote instructions based on their own experiences. We tasted some different breads from around the world – pitta, bagels, brioche and malt loaf. Many children had never tasted malt loaf and were surprised that they enjoyed it!











For a special treat, we had a visit from a local theatre company who put on a performance of The Gingerbread Man. We thoroughly enjoyed the visit and got involved with the songs and actions.

Finally, we read The Three Billy Goats Gruff. The children enjoyed acting out the story and making bridges out of different materials for the goats to cross.



This term was also our first competitive sports day. The children took part in all of the different events and showed real sportsmanship. We were very proud of them!

We have had a fantastic year in Reception and we wish all of the children a successful transition into year 1!


### **Year 1 – Mrs Sweet and Miss Hamilton**




This term in Maths, we have been learning about money. The children have been recognising and naming different coins and notes, including 1p, 2p, 5p, 10p, 20p, 50p, £1, £2, and £5 and £10 notes. They have been learning to understand the value of each coin and note, and that the size or colour does not always match its worth.



In History we have been learning about castles. We have explored artefacts, the parts of a castle and learned about how they changed over time. The children even got to make their own castle from 'junk modelling' materials.



In English, we have been creating our own stories based on *The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch*. The children explored the structure of the original story, discussed the characters and setting, and identified the problem and solution. Using this as inspiration, they planned and wrote their own versions.







In Science, we have been learning about different types of leaves and how to identify them by their shapes, sizes, and textures. To link our learning with creativity, we used the leaves to create beautiful leaf art.



## **Year 2 – Mr Cotton and Mrs Cottingham**

## **The Space Race**

This term, the children have been fascinated by our history topic as we explored the thrilling events of the Space Race. Guided by our curiosity question, 'Who won the Space Race?', the children have uncovered key events, people, and achievements that shaped this historic period. Through rich class discussions and activities, we have explored the timeline of space exploration, the competition between the USA and the USSR, and the incredible achievements of astronauts. The children have used a range of historical sources to answer questions and draw conclusions about the significance of these events.





A highlight of the term was our exciting trip to Herstmonceux Science Centre, where the children had the opportunity to bring their learning to life. They took part in a wide range of hands-on experiments and interactive exhibits, deepening their understanding of scientific concepts in a fun and engaging way. One of the most memorable moments was a live science demonstration where the children saw a simulation of how a gas fuel tank works. They also learned about the essential equipment astronauts need to survive during their missions, including space suits and oxygen supplies. The visit was a wonderful way to enhance the children's learning and spark their curiosity about the world beyond Earth.

As artists, the children have been studying the work of Peter Thorpe, a contemporary artist known for his bold, abstract space-themed art. Inspired by his unique style, the children created their own stunning masterpieces using a variety of printing techniques, including block printing, monoprinting, and stamping. They experimented with colour, shape, and composition to produce vibrant, dynamic images that reflect the excitement and energy of space exploration. The final pieces are truly eye-catching and a testament to the children's creativity and growing confidence as artists.









## **Year 3 – Mr Brown and Mrs Manley**

Term 6 has been a wonderful term in Year 3. The children have continued to work hard through assessments and heatwaves to continue to do us all proud. Our focus this term was 'Rainforests' and the children have completed a variety of different pieces of work linked to this. We have explored different rainforest animals, where the rainforests are around the world and even created our own weather reports for different rainforests which we performed at the front of the class.

During Design and Technology, we have been learning about sewing. We explored different materials and thought about why objects are made using different materials. We then started practising different techniques such as overstitch and cross stitch to get our fingers ready for our final project. Finally, using the design we drew, we sewed together material and filled it with stuffing to create our very own rainforest animal soft toy.



This term we have been learning about plants in Science. We have conducted experiments in what a plant needs by planting control plants and then planting others that are missing one of the needs of a plant. We have enjoyed seeing some grow and discussing why some of them have not grown.

We have also looked at water transportation in a plant by putting celery into coloured water and seeing it move up the celery using capillary action.




During PE we have been practising our cricket and rounders skills. The children have enjoyed the weather and further developing skills with hand-eye coordination and team work. The children have all been engaging well and showing support for each other to achieve.

## **Year 4 – Miss Godfrey, Mrs Brown and Miss Ogg**

What a very busy and fun end to Year 4! We are so proud of what all the children have achieved.

This term in Geography, we have been learning all about trade, with a particular focus on importing and exporting. The children explored why trade is essential in our everyday lives, examining how different countries rely on each other for goods and services. We also took a look back through history to understand how trade developed over time, from ancient trading routes to the global trade networks we rely on today. Through discussions, activities and real-



world examples, the children gained a deeper understanding of how trade shapes our world and connects us with people and places across the globe.

In Maths this term, we have been exploring shapes, with a focus on identifying and classifying different types of triangles, quadrilaterals, and polygons. We also learned about angles and how to recognise them in various shapes. We have also been developing our understanding of statistics by interpreting and drawing a range of graphs, including line graphs and using them to represent and analyse data.

In English we have been diving into the wonderful world of storytelling, with a special focus on using speech punctuation accurately. Two much-loved texts, Pesky Rat by Lauren Child and



Fly, Eagle, Fly by Christopher Gregorowski, have inspired thoughtful discussion, lively writing and lots of creativity.

The children particularly enjoyed crafting their own imaginative stories, applying all the key writing skills they've developed throughout the year. From exciting dialogue to vivid descriptions, it's been a joy to see their confidence and flair for writing grow.

## **Year 5 – Mrs Butler, Mrs Daines and Miss Piggott**





As we approach the end of the final term, it is a good time to reflect on some of the fantastic learning we have been getting up to in Year 5.



In English, we have been concentrating on using relative clauses, rich and precise language and parenthesis within our fiction and non fiction writing. We have written about a rainforest setting and then used the book 'The Day the Crayons Quit' to write letters, improving the language choices to make the letters more interesting using precise and interesting vocabulary.

In Maths, we have been exploring graphs, using decimals, knowing how to add and subtract decimals with different decimal places and explored negative numbers and volume.



In History, we have been learning about the Titanic. We have looked

at how and why the Titanic sank and questioned whether this disaster could have been avoided.

We have also had a lot of fun this term! We had our Year 5 camp sleep over, which was a lot of fun and went quickly with all children being very well behaved.



We had Sports Day which saw a lot of fierce competition.



The Year 5s competed in a football tournament, coming second overall. We finished off the term with Race for Life, a Library trip and Bough Beech trip, all of which made a brilliant end to a very busy term.





## Mr Morgans – Head of Year 7

I cannot believe we are nearly at the end of the academic year! Year 7 has flown by in a flash! Term 6 has been another successful term for the year group with so much going on. It doesn't seem that long ago that we were welcoming them in for their transition days and now they are almost in Year 8! We continue to be proud of them and it has been lovely celebrating their successes with them again this term. Well done to those nominated for the Sports Awards and Honours Evening and huge congratulations to those that enjoyed their Silver, Gold and Platinum Awards in Term 6 – you are all amazing! The behaviour ratio for the whole year is 90% and the year group have amassed over 150,000 reward points!

#### **Attendance**

Attendance is so important to education and continues to be a focus daily during mentor and celebrated weekly during assembly. Unfortunately, Year 7 attendance has dropped considerably this term - at the time of writing Year 7 have 91.4% attendance for the academic year. Essentially this can be interpreted by saying that every student in the year group has a day off school once a fortnight (which isn't the case of course but how the data breaks down). There is so much research that demonstrates the impact of attendance on student outcomes.

Thank you for your continued support in ensuring your son/daughter is in school unless they are genuinely too unwell to attend. It does, and will, help them so much with their learning! Let's hope we can hit the ground running in September and keep that percentage much higher all year.



#### Day One


The students were dropped off at Devil's Dyke with full rucksacks ready for the day's hike. The three teams used their map and compass skills to find their way to Parkwood Campsite



#### **Day Two**



#### Taster days:

Term 6 has had a focus around post 16 options where students had a week learning about different types of qualifications, colleges, sixth forms and apprenticeships and what pathways/ vocations these could offer to them. Students have been encouraged to attend taster days at local colleges and sixth forms to get a feel for what options they may want to take post 16.

#### June Mocks:

#### Mentor Structure for next year.

The year team has been working closely with the KS4 team around how we can support students moving into Year 11 and ensuring that they are receiving maximum support to ensure progress. #### Warhammer World Success - Mr Jackson





Once again, Soundworks are offering free after school music workshops. They are currently recruiting students for an 11-16yr group to run from September 2025.


The sessions will take place at the Hailsham Family Hub, Hailsham East Community Centre, Vega Close, BN27 2JZ.
